#### What Would Love Do?

Each year, as we move through the Easter season, there always comes a time when I am simply overwhelmed as I ponder Jesus' extravagant love for us as he submitted himself to the cross. Sometimes it happens on Maundy Thursday, sometimes on Good Friday or on Easter morning but it always happens and I am grateful for the reminder.

The truth is that my theology, or everything I know or understand about God, comes down to one profoundly simple word: Love. When I consider the nature and character of God, I start with the concept of Divine Love and launch out from there into questions about creation, humanity, sin, salvation, the Trinity and much more. I submit that everything in life becomes more comprehensible and more purposeful when we finally begin to understand that love is the foundational essence of the holiness God.

That does not mean that I think I have all the answers to all of life's questions.
Rather, it means I have learned that when I am able to live in the image of Divine
Love, then life becomes joy filled, peace full, and purpose driven. Even in those
times when I lose my way, or when issues are not clear, or life is a struggle I
have discovered that finding my way back to wholeness and light is a matter of
asking the Love question. The question can be asked in many forms but
essentially it always comes down to "What would Love do? or "What is the most loving thing I can do in this

Here I am single and didn't really want to mix with a bunch of old married couples but I did not want to offend them so I told them I was just visiting.

The next Sunday I decided to sit on the other side of the aisle and sat behind Don Linton. I knew of Don because his firm interviewed me for a position for one of his clients. So I felt that this was safe place to sit. But guess who sat behind me? Mel and Marion again! What was I going to do? They again invited me and since this was 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday and I was truly thinking of becoming a member I thought, "I am trapped". Again I begged off as I said I would be moving to Middletown and would probably attend there. Just a bit of little white lie in church.

#### STEWARDSHIP CORNER

"I the Lord do not change. So you O descendants of Jacob, are not destroyed." Malachi 3:6

The Israelite remnant has returned from exile in Babylon, released, freed and called to rebuild the temple, city, and society. God looked upon them with favor at their early endeavors, their intentions were good – but it is easier to slide downhill than to work uphill. We are all too human.

They lost their God vision. The reconstruction of the temple was less an imperative than their own desires, there were more immediate things – things that were not God centered. But for the grace of God, for the grandeur of his character and his steadfastness, God did not destroy them for their apostasy and failures. "Return to me, and I will return to you", God told them. Malachi 3:7

Apostasy, turning from God covers a lot of sins. They had abandoned the task of rebuilding the temple, but they were building fine homes for themselves – perhaps using the materials dedicated to the temple.

God's word through his prophet, Malachi, was that they were robbing him. They were steeped in their pride, their arrogance, and their detachment from God. In abject denial, they asked how they were robbing God. They were giving the demanded sacrifices. They believed they never left God because they always were observing the old laws. How should they return to God – is it not God who has left them. Is it not God who has withheld his blessing? Do we do the same – you know the answer? They were giving God offerings short of the tithe and less than their first fruits. It is a log in our own eye as we try to remove the splinter in another's. We are them, they are us!

God asks for the whole tithe so that the storehouse may have food for all in need. Their sacrificial offerings sustained the priests, poor, widows and orphans. God does not need your tithe and offering for himself, he wants your offerings to sustain the poor. He wants your humble and contrite heart, obedience to his command, and your desire to please him by providing to his world ministry. The tithe and first fruits gives us the opportunity to give graciously and extravagantly. By doing this, God demonstrates to the convicted world how he works through his disciples. God promises he will return to us when we return to him in obedience. This is how we return to God, by being obedient.

Tithing is a discipline we practice in our faith, as we do in prayer (time with him), giving of ourselves through volunteering to his work, giving ourselves through personal relationships with others, being in relationship with God more than an hour on Sunday morning. If you accept the command and wrap yourself around the idea of a God sized commitment in your life, you will be blessed as his child. It is not hard to become a tithing Christian. It only takes a little planning and maybe a great deal of commitment. God will accept small steps. What he wants is the first step and then another. Think of that first step as your first fruit.



#### Calvary - A House of True Corporate Worship

Corporate Worship, simply put, is the action of a group of people coming together to praise God with one united heart and voice. Different than the private devotion we need and express as we personally interact with God, corporate worship uses the entire church body (body of Christ) together as one to speak, pray and sing our glory to God. This is the primary function of our beautiful Sanctuary.

Acoustics are a crucial aspect of the corporate worship experience. Ideally, all the sounds we make are reflected and projected, without interference, throughout the worship space. When sounds are muffled by sound absorbing materials (soft or porous materials that absorb sound waves) they are softer and weaker than intended, creating a dull exchange. This diminishes overall sound production, isolates individuals, and inhibits participation.

Unlike a theater or a music hall, where the audience is a spectator and the desire is to only hear and see what is going on up front, corporate worship involves all of us, especially the congregation, as lead players in our acts of praise and prayer - not just spectators. Thus, the church nave (where the congregation is) needs to be constructed of sound reflecting materials that project the sound waves outward to their fullest extent – and Calvary was indeed made of such materials. We are blessed!

Through the years, additions such as pew cushions and carpeting that cover the sound reflecting surfaces closest to the congregation have diminished the sound throughout the room. Improvements to the chancel area and ceiling have helped to liven the acoustics. Short of removing the pew cushions, the most important thing we can do is to remove the aisle carpeting, which will allow more of the congregation's sound to be reflected and heard. The more the sanctuary can act in total – all parts working together – to reflect and enjoy the full measure of our praise, the more we become an instrument of true corporate worship. This reflects our understanding of worshiping together, not alone, with each other and with those new to Calvary.

Pastor Terry K. Boggs, in an article from "Meeting House Essays – Acoustics for Liturgy" sums it up beautifully: "Clearly if worship is a public event, if God demands hospitality toward the stranger, if all are actors in the liturgy, then the acoustics of the environment can shape a sense of belonging and community by providing authentic sound that is alive and real as the people present are alive and real. As we create these places of worship, our highest priority is that we take seriously this vision."

One additional benefit of returning the aisles to their original tile surface will be the ease of handicapped/ wheelchair access throughout the sanctuary.

The aisle rugs have recently been identified by the Trustees to be replaced due to wear and "buckling". I have met with the Trustees and they have agreed that the rugs will be removed, but not replaced at this time, to give us the opportunity to enhance the acoustics. The Trustee's timeline for rug removal will be late spring.


